



FOCUS: Lower Richland Heritage Corridor presented the opportunity for guests to experience the richly diverse culture, heritage and natural beauty of the Lower Richland. Our June 2014 event was a unique 3-day <u>FREE</u> event promoting Lower Richland County, SC designed for tourists, as well as those with special interest and/or work related to historical preservation/conservation, tourism, eco-development and *agri*-education. The event venues were in rural settings, but only about 13 miles from Columbia, the capital city of South Carolina. Activities included: <u>6/19-Juneteenth Historic Reception</u> at the Harriet Barber House, a restored home originally owned by ex-slaves(1880's), and which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, <u>6/20</u>-Guided Tours: Gems of the Lower Richland Heritage Corridor (Congaree National Park, historic homes and plantations such as Goodwill, a rice plantation, etc.), Farm-to-Table Feast on the grounds of the majestic Wavering Place Plantation which dates back to 1850, and featuring locally grown/raised foods), and <u>6-21</u>- Expo & Workshops (held at the St. John Baptist Church Wellness Center). Genealogy discussions were led by Debbie Bloom, Walker Local History Room-RCPL, Chicora Foundation and other local historians. Renowned Artist Jonathan Green was our special guest. The event concluded with the Youth Education Field Day and Lunch on Historic Grounds at the Harriet Barber House. (Presented by SERCO through Richland County Hospitality Tax Grant & Supported by RC Conservation Commission.)

Juneteenth Historic Reception

The Juneteenth Historic Reception, held at the Harriet Barber House, was SERCO's first annual event honoring the oldest known celebration commemorating the ending of slavery in the United States. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the once enslaved were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation - which had become official January 1, 1863. Union Army General Granger walked out onto the balcony of Ashton Villa, a grand brick mansion, and read to the people of Texas, General Order Number 3 which began most significantly with:

"The people of Texas are informed that in accordance with a Proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of rights and rights of property between former masters and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and free laborer."

Guided Tour ~ Goodwill Plantation

Larry Faulkenberry purchased Goodwill Plantation in 1995 with the intent of selling it for profit; however, he fell in love with its rich history and decided on keeping it instead. With each group of visitors, he talks about the history of Goodwill Plantation and his efforts to maintain the historical integrity of the property. What impresses you the most is how he cherishes the personal research done about the slaves who once inhabited the plantation and toiled in the rice fields and other areas of work throughout the 3,000+ acres. He welcomes the yearly pilgrimage to the property that has been established by the Goodwill Baptist Church. After he purchased this property, Larry Faulkenberry has "totally immersed himself in its history while restoring key elements of its historic character and opening the site for public tours." Farm-to-Table Feast ~ Wavering Place Plantation



The **Farm-to-Table Feast**, featuring local foods, was held on the grounds of the Wavering Place Plantation. The Greek Revival big house dates to 1850. The numerous outbuildings all date from 1790 and include the brick kitchen house, the double slave cabin, the smokehouse, the plantation office, and the barn. In 2013, Weston Adams III and Robert Adams VI acquired Wavering Place from their Uncle Julian, continuing Adams ownership dating back to 1768.

Guests dined on pulled BBQ pork, sautéed red & yellow peppers, corn-on-the-cob, salad greens /veggie varieties, cakes and breads prepared by Big T Catering. Adams' Catering also prepared chicken bog and quail breasts, which were donated by the local Manchester Farms company, and which were wrapped in bacon and grilled.



Midlands Authority for Sports, Tourism and Conventions Visits Lower Richland Heritage Corridor SERCO Provides Guided Tour

Kelly Barbrey, VP of Sales and Marketing, brought her staff from the Midlands Authority for Conventions, Sports and Tourism to Lower Richland for a tour of the little known historical gems. The tour began at the historic Harriet Barber House where Marie Barber Adams met them and announced plans for the day. The first stop was the Goodwill Plantation where owner Larry Faulkenberry greeted them and shared the history of the property and his vision for tourism opportunities there. The tour included the Main House where Governor Duncan Clinch Heyward was born in 1864, two slave cabins, the Mill House with its 1760 cast iron water wheel and the blacksmith shop. The Goodwill Plantation has over 38 documented historic sites covering an area of approximately three thousand acres.

The group departed from Goodwill around noon to stop for lunch at the newly opened St. John Holistic Wellness Center where they enjoyed a special meal prepared by Chef Gene Adams. After finishing off some homemade peach cobbler topped with ice cream, the group traveled down Air Base Road to the historic Wavering Place Plantation. Shana Adams, one of the owners, met the group in the beautiful gardens before she took the special visitors on a tour of the main level of the Greek Revival mansion built in 1854.

The tour continued from there to St. John's Episcopal Church of Congaree, Red Hill Baptist Church and to the oldest Baptist Church in Richland County, Congaree Baptist Church. The group returned to the Harriet Barber House at the end of the tour to debrief. Future plans were discussed that included tours of Lower Richland historic sites offered through the Columbia Metropolitan Convention and Visitors Bureau. Barbrey and her staff are looking forward to the second half of their tour in the early fall to visit additional historic sites in Hopkins, Gadsden and Eastover.

Promoting The Lower Richland Heritage Corridor - SERCO & Laurelwood Plantation Owners Partner

New Lower Richland resident Jeremy Thomas (formerly of London, England) visited the Harriet Barber House on the final day of *FOCUS: Lower Richland*. Deborah Scott Brooks requested that he sign the visitor/guest book. Brooks learned that the guest was the new owner of the Laurelwood Plantation off Garners Ferry Road, and she quickly went on a mission to make sure that he was introduced to Marie Barber Adams, SERCO Board Director. The meeting was fruitful! Adams, working with her sisters, oversaw the restoration of the Harriet Barber House, which is now on the National Register of Historic Places. To say the least, an exchange began regarding historical restoration, preservation, conservation and promoting early homes and plantations as "gems" of the Lower Richland Heritage Corridor. The two agreed to exchange support and partner in these common interests. Thomas has been invited to attend the next SERCO board meeting, and hopefully, the second half of the Midlands Authority for Conventions, Sports and Tourism staff's tour in the early fall will include a visit to the Laurelwood Plantation.

They have bought one of the few remaining plantations in South Carolina. Jackie says: "We were thinking of types of property but not with any great expectations of finding any of them. Then Jeremy said he wanted a plantation to renovate and I told him there weren't any left."

But there was one, built around 1830. Laurelwood Plantation, and its 33 acres set in a 150-acre forest was the only plantation in the area. And Jackie found it online just before Christmas 2010.
