





Hammond School Students Take Educational Tour of Historical Harriet Barber House



Third Grade students and teachers from the Hammond School in Columbia visited the Historical Harriet Barber House on Dec. 4th. The educational tour consisted of a walking tour and history lessons about the home's owners and other residents who were ex-slaves of the Lower Richland area. Great-Granddaughters of Harriet Barber, Marie B. Adams, Carrie B. White, and Mary B. Kirkland, created this unique learning experience for the students. Joann Lowman Washington provided samples, recipes and lessons on making sweet potato pies. Mr. Thomas "Buddy" McCracken, whose grandparents operated a farm and general store in the 1920's, showed the students how sweet potatoes were stored outside in a potato bank. The Goodwyn Cemetery ~ Hopkins, SC

Nestled in the woods near St. John Baptist Church in Hopkins is an almost forgotten cemetery that once belonged to the family of Keziah Goodwyn Hopkins Brevard. According to historical records, she and her husband Joseph Brevard are buried on this tract of land. Keziah died in 1886, and her husband died earlier in 1842. Ownership of the property has changed several times over the years, and the last burial was in 1971. Presently, the gravesites on this land are overgrown with stately pine trees and hardwoods, and some of the sunken graves now have young trees towering out of these cavities.

Members of SERCO and St. John Baptist Church have made several visits to the property after meeting with the current owner. The group is working on a proposal to preserve and maintain the property as an historical cemetery just like the Government Cemetery, now renamed Resurrection Memorial Garden, located just across Chappell Creek which separates the two cemeteries. Many local families have loved ones buried in the Goodwyn Cemetery with headstones dating back to the early 1900s. Numerous unmarked graves predate those with headstones. This area is now in desperate need of clearing and tender loving care. Plans include providing easy access to the site from the rear of the Government Cemetery off Ault Road.
