Collaboration key to developing tourism potential of Lower

"I didn't even know there was a national park here," said Doris Pugh of Greer, who visited for the first time during October's SwampFest. She intends to return. Pugh came here with the New Horizon RVers. The group set up at the Harriet Barber House for a weekend of blues and jazz, history and barbecue that had people circulating among the park, Mt. Moriah Baptist Church and the Barber House.

Adams met with tourism officials this summer to give them a taste of what's available in a day: Visits to Goodwill Plantation; Wavering Place, a plantation with meticulous grounds; Congaree Baptist Church, which has the old slave gallery upstairs; and the Barber House. "The entire staff of 15 people came out for the day, because they said they get quite a number of calls asking about heritage tourism. So we've created a package for them that we're trying to finalize," Adams said.

The 150th anniversary of the burning of Columbia and the end of the Civil War provide an opportunity for Lower Richland to capitalize on heritage tourism, said Andrea Mensink, communications director at the Midlands Authority for Conventions, Sports & Tourism. She said attractions in the countryside that haven't routinely been open to the public seem to be moving in that direction. "The stars are aligning." "Much of it has to do with the efforts of Adams and SERCO, observers said. Still, there's more to be done.



12th Annual SwampFest Student Art Competition

The 12th Annual SwampFest Student Art Competition, co-sponsored by the Congaree National Park, Southeast Rural Community Outreach (SERCO), and the Friends of Congaree Swamp (FOCS), provided an opportunity for young artists from the Midlands to showcase their talent while celebrating Congaree's diverse resources. In celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Wilderness Act, this year's art competition theme was, "Wilderness is closer than you think." Students in grades K-8 submitted art from any medium, depicting a close-up view of plants, animals or recreational opportunities found within the Congaree National Park Wilderness. Park staff selected first place and honorable mentions from the entries. The first place entries received cash prizes, provided by FOCS and SERCO. 

Historic Columbia Foundation - 36TH Annual Jubilee: Festival of Heritage



The 36th Annual Jubilee: Festival of Heritage was held on August 23, 2014, on the grounds of the historic Mann-Simons Site, and featured a variety of activities including hands-on demonstrations from some of the region's artists and craftsmen, musical entertainment including African drumming, R&B, jazz, and gospel, and vendors with African-influenced and traditional merchandise. Highlights of the festival also included tours of the Mann-Simons Site, African-American heritage sites tours, and many other activities throughout the day. SERCO volunteers, Primus, Gunter, Kirkland and White manned a display of information and artifacts representing the Lower Richland Heritage Corridor.

Joint Project: Historic Columbia, Lower Richland High & Harriet Barber House with Dr. Daniella Cook, USC

-background from Historic Columbia's website. . .

Historic Columbia, with support from an Institute of Museum and Library Services grant and South Carolina Humanities Council grant, partners with Richland One School District to provide 10th and 11th grade U.S. History students a unique learning experience. Piloted in 2011-2012 and implemented the three following school years, nearly 150 students from C.A. Johnson High School and Lower Richland High School have utilized the city's and county's historic house museums and other resources as a local laboratory for learning about history. This annual program includes ten in-class learning sessions, field trips, inter-generational interactions and media activities throughout the school year in an effort to improve 21st-century skills development and civic engagement. This project designed resources to be used by participating teachers over time. All project presentations, including reference documents, activities and materials, have been developed with sustained usage in mind. This project measures the impact of student knowledge, career choices, intergenerational attitudes, media literacy and students' participation in civic activities. Products from this project will include web-based neighborhood tours, developed in partnership with students and local neighborhood communities, student-produced documentaries and a community engagement manual.

History tells us that the Village of Hopkins was once a bustling location, originally named “Hopkins Turnout” between 1836 and 1842, when the South Carolina Railroad from Charleston completed a turntable there. The train would come from Charleston, unload travelers who next took the stagecoach on to Columbia. The train would then “turn around” and return to Charleston. Through the 1920’s, the Village of Hopkins was thriving with general stores, gin mills, industries, residences and a Town Hall. The downtown hub is now extinct.
